1	1	<p><i>EVENING HERALD</i></p> <p>Focuses on rumors of President Nixon's eventual resignation the following day on August 9<sup>th</sup>, 1974. It highlights on the most important happenings of the Watergate scandal, Nixon's potential to have criminal charges, and the complications a resignation would cause for Nixon's successor.</p>	1974
1	2	<p><i>CHARLOTTE OBSERVER</i></p> <p>The headlines from the 5<sup>th</sup> to the 8<sup>th</sup> of August 1974 consist of the days of controversy before President Nixon announced his official resignation as President of the United States. Contents include impeachment efforts by Representative Rodino, Nixon releasing the private tapes, and consideration of resignation. The 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> of August 1974 newspapers focus on the resignation, Ford's inauguration, and Nixon's farewell address.</p>	1974, 1983
1	3	<p><i>MONROE MORNING WORLD</i></p> <p>These headlines consist of reported events on the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. Contents include Kennedy's arrival in Texas, his assassination, the murder of Lee Harvey Oswald by Jack Ruby, and Kennedy's burial at Arlington National Cemetery.</p>	1963
1	4	<p>MAGAZINES—<i>LIFE</i></p> <p>These consist of <i>LIFE</i> magazines describing the assassination, procession and burial of President John F. Kennedy. Additionally, there is a <i>LIFE</i> magazine highlighting the March on Washington during the Civil Rights Movement.</p> <p>*Arranged chronologically and contains magazines from the following: November 29<sup>th</sup> 1963, December 6<sup>th</sup> 1963, September 6<sup>th</sup> 1963.</p>	1963
